Fr Peter's Message

God Did Not Make Death

Following a week where several funerals were celebrated in our parish, I found the opening words from the book of Wisdom in last Sunday's readings, both confronting and consoling.

"God did not make death, nor does he rejoice in the destruction of the living" Wisdom 1:13.

If we are feeling brave enough, it might be an appropriate time for us to face that difficult issue about the role of God in our death. Phrases like, "All in God's good time" and "God must have wanted them in heaven" seems to suggest that God, who is the author of life, is also the decider (and instigator of our death). While there is a certain truth in that premise, we need to be careful not to turn God into the great puppeteer who is sitting in some operations room in heaven making arbitrary decisions about who will live and who will die today.

I was about to say "unfortunately" I see a lot of death in my work as a priest. But while there is sadness associated with some death, there is a reality to it that allows me to acknowledge something of what will happen to each of us, no matter how much we may try to put off the fateful day. Obviously, we would all wish for more time to live and to love and to enjoy a life that we sometimes take for granted, yet there is another more truthful part of us that knows that it shall come to us as it has to all through history. Naturally in that time of fear and uncertainty we turn to that which we understand offers solace and certainty, that offers purpose and cause: that is God – or rather our constructed version of God. There in lies part of our problem. How we see God makes a difference to how we see life and consequently death.

I am so pleased I gave God a chance to grow out of the rather stilted and childish image that I had in my youth. That was a God who made me have a 'buster' on my bike as well as sorting out my birthday presents or lack of them. A God totally responsible for the good and the bad in my life. "All part of God's plan" was the expected response to unrealised goals. Is it any wonder that we soon arrive at an image of God which needs to be both tolerated and adulated, a God who is capricious and arbitrary, all of which sits uncomfortably with the loving, benevolent, creator God whom we call Father, who counts every hair on our head.

The truth I have come to see is that mistakes happen, accidents are more about lack of care and poor timing and bodies wear out from living. While there are many lives that could be extended through greater care and generosity, we are still working on that. How we feed and clothe the world's poor, how we negotiate the greed and oppression of certain governments, how we get medical assistance to those who are most in need. These are not God given problems but are largely of our own making.

Therefore, I cannot accept that God sends natural disasters on families. God does not kill us off. In fact, God wants nothing to do with death. We know this because of what we see in Jesus. In him, there is no darkness, only light, no revenge or retribution. God does not barge in but waits patiently for an invitation to enter our lives at whatever level we choose. Ready to meet us where we are, to embrace us and hold us close when the going gets tough, and help us find the way forward, even on that last day when we find the way home.

Meanwhile God is there saying "Is there anything I can do to help?"

SYNOD24 marks the Implementation Phase of the Fifth Plenary Council—an update.

Since 2018 our Australian church has been asking the question: 'What is the Holy Spirit asking of us at this time?' Through listening, dialogue and discernment, your voices have been heard and captured through Plenary Council Decrees. Now it is time to move our Archdiocese into action. 'How can we be a more co-responsible church on mission?'

Our Archdiocesan synod is the next step on the Plenary Council journey and will discern practical and measurable actions that we will take as an Archdiocese to implement the focus areas (Decrees) that came out of the Plenary Council. On 6/7 September and 11/12 October, the Archdiocese of Brisbane will celebrate a SYNOD to mark the next phase of the Plenary Council journey. This will discern the practical and Spirit-led actions that we as an Archdiocese need to undertake in the Implementation Phase. Bearing in mind that the Decrees have yet to be officially approved by the Apostolic See, these actions will be practical and able to be implemented immediately.

The Synod Engagement Team and the Synod Writing Team will engage in strategic consultations with key stake holders, community members and Church agencies to help discern creative dreaming and actionable ideas about what is already happening within the Archdiocese that should be affirmed, what lessons can be learned from others and where the gaps and needs are. *Please pray for our parish representatives in attendance.*

There will be a series of presentations given around the Archdiocese on what synodality actually is, what it means for the global church and for our own community. *You may like to attend the Brisbane East Deanery Information Session, led by Bishop Tim Norton, on Thursday 18 July at 7pm in the Mt Carmel school hall, Norfolk Street, Coorparoo.*

In other News ...

LITURGICAL MINISTRY

All Christian ministry is about service, not power or prestige. All those who minister in the Church act in Christ's name. Jesus offered the Church a model of true Christian service shortly before his death when he took off his outer garment, wrapped a towel around his waist, got down on his hands and knees and washed his disciples' dirty, smelly feet.

The term 'liturgical ministry' refers to service within and to the worshipping community. Members of the community are called to perform particular liturgical ministries in order to facilitate the assembly's liturgical prayer. These liturgical ministers include the priest celebrant or presider, ministers of communion, sacristans and servers, readers, ministers of music and hospitality ministers.

People are called to different ministries depending on their particular gifts and their individual personalities. Someone should only perform a certain ministry if she or he has the skills and qualities needed to serve the community well in that role.

The *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* states clearly that all involved in liturgical ministry 'must be and trained to perform their functions in a correct and orderly manner' (CSL 29).

The question for all liturgical ministers to ask themselves after carrying out their role is 'Did I help the community to pray?'

SACRISTANS AND SERVERS

Many people arriving for Mass would be unaware of the effort that goes into preparing the worship environment and the items needed for the celebration. The 'behind the scenes' ministry of sacristans is an essential service to the worshipping assembly. Sacristans take responsibility for opening up the church, turning on lights and microphones, putting out the Roman Missal (prayer book) and Lectionary (book of scripture readings) - both marked at the right place of course! - and setting out chalices, plates, cruets, bread and wine, so that Mass can be celebrated.

The fundamental contribution of servers is to facilitate a smooth liturgy by anticipating the needs of the presider and other members of the assembly, leading the way where necessary, yet rarely being noticed themselves. This requires self-discipline and forethought so that unnecessary movement can be avoided. It is important that the servers be neatly attired and move with confidence and grace in order to contribute to the prayerful atmosphere of the liturgy. Sacristans and servers need to understand the order of the liturgy and about the sacred vestments and vessels used in liturgy.

They put themselves at the service of the community and its worship and so help the liturgy become truly an act of worship and thanksgiving for all.

I'd like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank those within our Parish who work tirelessly in the many and varied ministries, giving up their personal time to ensure our liturgies continue to be prayerful, enriching and authentic. Fr Peter



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
